Critical trends in global research environment




TDR: Stewardship for Research on infectious diseases of poverty


Knowledge management and sharing

- Supporting active participation of stakeholders at large health forums through the *Meeting Knowledge Hubs* in partnership with UNESCO/MoST






TropIKA.net Operational Framework



Sharing strategic knowledge with researchers and policy makers

- Acquiring and sharing best scientific evidence resulting from research on infectious diseases of poverty
- Commissioning authoritative reviews and technical briefs to facilitate the translation of research findings into practice and policy
- Inviting and posting original views, perspectives and comments from research leaders and stakeholders
- Improving access to published scientific literature on infectious diseases of poverty through partnering with other information providers
- Advocating for open (or free) access to published information on these diseases


TropIKA.net target user groups

The human factor: fostering a bottom up approach

- TropIKA reviews commissioned globally
- Input from TropIKA journal clubs based in universities in the North and in the South
- Input from country based disease and thematic reference groups working in CoPs
- Interactive features for users' feedback
- TropIKA Career Development Fellowships (CDF) and sabbatical opportunities for knowledge management and translation in infectious diseases of poverty

Partnering with BIREME/PAHO

International Editorial Team

- An editor in chief coordinates a network of freelance journalists, science writers, scientists
- Selection of content backed by scientific and technical expertise
- Commissioning of scientific and technical content: (news, editorial opinion, articles, commentaries)
- Overall editorial responsibility to develop and maintain the editorial line of the site
- Monitoring of the TropIKA content for quality and relevance to the target readership.

- Output: Comprehensive (15-5-2) reviews





TropIKA Reviews will be:


- authoritative source of up-to-date, peer-reviewed, relevant, scientific reviews on issues related to infectious diseases of poverty



- Setting up of secured collaborative workspaces and public "evidence hubs" on TropIKA.net




